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For over three years, Mawuvio's Outreach Programme has partnered with The School Fund. The School Fund is an online community that brings together donors and students and schools in need of funding. Six MOP students are featured on The School Fund's Website every year and can journal back and forth with donors.

Recently, MOP's Class 5 student Randolf Adjanor, who is one of the 6 MOP students featured on The School Fund's website, received financial support from a family willing to do anything to support Randolf and MOP.

The passage below is an email written from the children's mother to The School Fund:

"My sons, Ivan and Konstantin Dragovic, completed the funding for Randolf A. They had \$150 they earned doing chores which they applied because his deadline was coming up. They read through all those with the deadline approaching. They made pancake and fruit samples to go door to door to the neighbors that they know and took orders to deliver them breakfast coming up next weekend. They even engaged their buddies, Owen and Cameron, to go with them. They got 14 orders for next weekend. Some neighbors were telling them to go to so and so and they would order too, but we had to stop so we make sure we could deliver the orders we have and get them there on time and warm.

The boys also wanted to help Randolf since his deadline was close. We decided to skip dinner so we can keep to our budget and give Randolf what he needed. The boys at first were unsure of no dinner but we talked about it and Ivan said, "It's depressing that we can skip dinner one night and that can make a difference for someone to go to school for a year." We will be getting up early next Saturday as they have eleven orders of pancakes to deliver by 8 a.m. Who would of thought people get up so early on the weekend?!"

Building Progress Continues at Ayikuma

Thanks to another large donation from the Edmunds-Craft Foundation building progress at the future home of Mawuvio's Outreach Programme has been able to continue on.

The six classroom, two dormitory facility is nearing completion with an approximate move-in date set for September 2014.

With this donation, the second story roof structure is being created to prevent rain from standing on the first story roof and creating water damage. Pillars and a roof structure will be put onto the building and the walls can be built at a later date.



Funding will also be used to complete electrical works on the inside with some sockets, light fixtures and minor connections left to be done. Construction will also start on beds, desks and shelving and other furnitures on the inside of the building.

Mawuvio's Outreach will also soon begin construction on a summer hut outside of the main building. A summer hut is an open air building, similar to a pavilion seen at parks, that will be used by MOP for worship services, study area and lounge area. The funding for the summer hut is coming from the memorial money donated in the name of Steve Farwell, the father of MOP, who passed away suddenly last September.

This coming summer, painting works will also be completed on both the inside and outsides of the building. Painting will be done by volunteers and headed by Barbara Farwell.

As the move in date is fast approaching, directors, board members, staff and students are already preparing and getting excited. The building project began in February 2010 and after many years, we are finally able to see an end in sight.
