


Mawuvio's Outreach November 2011

Pascal Gelli, a father to Mawuvio's Outreach Programme, operates the culture group and arranged for both the borbobor drumming as well as the student performance for the ceremony. Gelli's wife Dada coached the girls and taught them the dancing.

Mawuvio's Outreach used this ceremony to announce its presence in the Kissemah Village community. MOP directors invited all parents, guardians, community members and volunteers to the ceremony. "A lot of people from the community came

around which was very good to make them aware of what we are doing here." said Eric Kwame Agoe. "It was encouraging to see so many people interested in our work." said Renee Farwell. "And of course all the kids having a good time at a party for them."

Cecilia Avorseh cooked jollof rice and chicken for MOP students and their parents and mineral soft drinks were shared with other attendees.

fun and keep them off the streets. Every Tuesday and Thursday from 5:00pm – 6:00pm approximately 15 MOP students meet and turn loose beads into unique bracelets. The beads come from the Somanya bead market and after the students and staff at MOP are finished crafting them into jewelry, they are then sold in the United States to generate income for the building of Mawuvio's Outreach permanent home in Ayikuma. The beads are sold in Eastern Iowa out of the home of Barbara Farwell and in Atlanta, Georgia out of the home of Elena Arosema as well as on etsy.com/mawuvios. "The beads have become somewhat of a fashion trend in Iowa." said Barb Farwell. "And they always spark a conversation about what is going on with MOP in Ghana."

This month, Mawuvio's Outreach Programme has reinstated one of their cultural programmes; teaching children Krobo bead making. This programme has been a part of Mawuvio's Outreach for a year and a half providing children with the opportunity to learn a craft, have

Directors are working on finishing the front 2 rooms first and continuing on from there. "Cementing work and block laying goes very quickly, we at MOP are just praying our funding sources remain strong so we can continue work through the dry season.



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Early Wednesday morning heavy rains fell in the Kissemah Village community. The rain caused severe flooding resulting in many people losing their homes and nine individuals to lose their lives.

Kissemah Village sits on a hill and at the base of the hill is a small river. The rain flooded the river and brought approximately 8 feet of standing water to the homes and businesses located nearest to the river. Other homes located slightly up the hill a bit experienced 3-4 feet of standing water in their homes. The families of MOP students Maybel Kmah, Grace Daebly and Felicia Afla were affected by the flooding. Kmah's guardians report having lost important documents such as birth certificates. "We saw televisions, clothes, even motorcycles floating down the river and after the
