Dedication of "Dad's Place"

A pavilion was erected at the new school in memory of co-director Renee Farwell's father, Steve Farwell. In Ghana, the pavilion is called a summer hut and is used for eating, playing, hanging out, and, when necessary, shelter from the rain or sun—has been lovingly named the "Dad's Place" in remembrance of Steve "Dad" Farwell. Over the past couple of months, some finishing touches were added to the hut, including the installation of broken-tile flooring, stairs to enter the raised space, and a low cement wall for seating and safety.

The funds used to build "Dad's Place" were entirely memorial money given a Steve's funeral to be used for Mawuvio's Outreach. A plaque was hung on the day of the dedication and pictures Steve and Barb Farwell and is inscribed "Dad's Place: In memory of Steven R. Farwell 10 November 1954 – 27 September 2013.

Barb and Renee Farwell were also presented with beads on behalf of the chief of Ayikuma as a sign of thanks for all that they have done for the children of Ayikuma and Kissemah in opening the new school that will help many disadvantaged children from the Ayikuma community.

The students and staff at Mawuvio's Outreach recently got to show off their artistic side as they all helped design the main hallway leading to the 6 classrooms at the Ayikuma school.

The project was entitled "Swimming Thru Education" and was led by Barb Farwell, a retired art teacher of 36 years and treasurer for MOP. Farwell began with an art lesson teaching MOP students about individuality and design as well as how to draw a fish. She had all students draw, design and color a fish on a piece of paper so everyone had a plan of what they were going to draw on the wall. Students then picked a space on the wall and enlarged their drawings with the help of Farwell and other MOP teachers and volunteers. All students had to draw their fish with a pencil and have it approved before they could start painting. They also painted their names on or around their fish. MOP teachers, staff and volunteers also painted their own fish as well. The main hallway at the Ayikuma school is now filled with fish of many shapes, sizes and designs.

The vision for the "Swimming Thru Education" hallway is that every MOP student that attends the Ayikuma school will paint a fish in the hallway filling it with fish as unique as the people who painted them and that students may return to the Ayikuma school many years from now and see the fish that they created when they attended MOP.
