Class 4 students at work

The first academic semester will be an exciting one for MOP students. Students will have the opportunity to participate in an after school Science Technology Engineering Mathematics (STEM) programme led by Omprakash volunteer Camirra Williamson of North Carolina – USA.

Williamson (right) came to Ghana in 2013 through the International Student Exchange Program (ISEP) and is returning for approximately seven months during a gap year between undergraduate and graduate school.

She received a partial scholarship from the Omprakash foundation to implement an after school STEM programme for MOP students.

Students will learn and conduct scientific experiments using recycled materials.

During the school day, most concepts students learn about are taught lecture style and due to lack of resources and time, very few experiments and projects are done. Williamson's after school programme will expose students to hands on learning which directors anticipate will increase learning during the school day, as well as interest in the areas of Science, technology, engineering and mathematics.
