"Today we ate beans. Everyone, they ate beans." said an excited Forgive Gborwosu.

Monday May 16<sup>th</sup> 2011 was a historic day for the children of Mawuvio's Outreach Programme. At the end of the morning class instead of going to play football or baseball, all MOP students were given lunch.

Omprakash Volunteer Briana Thomas travelled to Ghana for the month of May to volunteer at Mawuvio's Outreach. Thomas wanted to help MOP in a way that they really needed it and decided to implement a daily free lunch programme for all students.

Upon arriving in Ghana, Thomas wasted no time in evaluating what additional work she needed to do in order to make the lunch programme possible. She had already attained enough financial support from a donor base in Thomas's home of New Jersey but now needed to find support in Kissemah that would continue carrying out the programme.

Cecilia and Cena Avorseh cleaned out a small room inside their kitchen behind the classroom in which a weeks worth of food could be stored. They also volunteered to cook lunch everyday for the children.

Thomas attained enough funding from east coast donors to implement the lunch programme for six months and plans to acquire a stable source in which MOP can rely on for years to come.

In the meantime, children who just a few weeks ago did not know where their next meal would come from can now rely on receiving at least one meal a day!
