## A Summer to Volunteer at M.O.P.

Volunteer teachers play a key role in the everyday operations of Mawuvio's Outreach Programme and during the summer of 2012, MOP directors are finding themselves blessed with a large and diverse group of volunteers who will visit throughout the summer months.

Mawuvio's Outreach established a relationship with Student Youth Travel Opportunity (SYTO) providing MOP with volunteers who lived on-site for anywhere from one-six months however for over a year SYTO has been experiencing problems

that prevented the organization from providing volunteers to groups like MOP that depend on them. The lack of SYTO volunteers left MOP very understaffed. Directors were forced to hire additional Ghanaian staff to replace STYO volunteers.

In June, Boa Woyonko, a new volunteer organization similar to SYTO, based out of Austria, accepted MOP as their first organizational partner. Three volunteers are already scheduled to work for at least six weeks over the summer starting in July. Boa Woyonko was started by Florian Riegler who gained interest after spending time at the University of Ghana.

Apart from Boa Woyonko, more and more individual volunteers are spending time visiting and working at MOP. As the story and good work being done at MOP travels literally around the world, directors are seeing more and more individuals wanting to visit and get involved with the programme.

## **Building Progress Report:**

Cement flooring has been poured for the two dormitories and six classrooms on the ground floor of the future home of Mawuvio's Outreach Programme. Director and building overseer Eric Kwame Agoe is ensuring that the month of July is spent bringing up the remaining walls in the classrooms, hallways and girls dormitory.



Builders cut cement blocks by hand. One bag of cement cuts twenty five blocks. It takes, on average, three days to cut five hundred blocks. After the five hundred blocks are cut, builders then spend approximately three days laying those blocks to form walls.

By the end of July, directors expect that all the walls on the ground floor of the building to ceiling level. Plans will then be made to pour cement roofing on the ground floor.

MOP directors are aiming to move into the ground floor of the new building by the beginning of the 2012 – 2013 school year in September.

An estimated forty children will begin boarding in September with additional day students attending from the Ayikuma community and surrounding areas.

As the month of May wound down, the MOP board found themselves only a few dollars short of their \$25,000 goal. MOP directors were beyond belief of how large the MOP support system is. All money raised will go to finalize the completion of the ground floor of MOP's permanent home in Ayikuma Township. "The success of this fundraiser ensures that next school year and years to come will no longer be outside under trees but instead inside comfortable classrooms." said director Renee Farwell. "We have been working hard for three years and now we can begin to see the successes of all the hard works and we give all the thanks to those who have been supporting MOP financially." said director Eric Kwame Agoe.
