January

MOP celebrated the new year by beginning the second term of the 2012-2013 new year. As 6 month long volunteer Sarah Karner prepared to leave Ghana, directors hired a new teacher Sir Austine Tettey Gabo to replace Karner as Class 3 teacher. Austine began teaching Class 3 at MOP in mid-January. Previously Austine had worked as a teacher at a Primary school in Nigeria where he grew up.

February

The Pentecostal University Christian College – Accra made their third in kind donation to Mawuvio's Outreach Programme. College students organized a collection drive of school supplies, clothing, food stuffs and other items which was then donated to MOP. Students from the college also took time to interact with MOP students giving advice and answering questions about how to get into college and succeed while there.

March

The Mawuvio's Outreach student body took a field trip, led by Secretary Elena Arosemena, to the Accra Kotoka International Airport. At the airport MOP students learned the procedures in which they must go through to travel in and out of the country. Highlights from the trip included; seeing airplanes on the tarmac, getting to walk through the metal detector and the baggage claim area.

April

Information Communication Technologoy (ICT) classes were introduced to the Primary timetable. ICT is a subject where students learn about different types of technology and learn how to operate and use them. Second hand computers were donated from the U.S. and Europe and for the first time MOP students saw computers and are now learning basic typing skills.

May

Teachers at Mawuvio's Outreach Programme began attending Teacher Training Courses at the MCA Training Institution North Legon – Haatso. MOP teachers are high school graduates with no additional teacher training skills thus, directors enrolled them in a one year training class. MOP is covering all the costs.





June

Mawuvio's Outreach participated in the inter-school games for the first time. Inter-school games are organized soccer games between teams from different schools in and around Kissemah Village. The MOP soccer team consisted of any student aged 10 and older who wanted to participate on the team. The highlight for all Mawuvio's students was the final game against Dome in which MOP was down 0-2 at the half and went on to win the game 4-2.

Students hope to have even better inter-school games in coming years.

July

The 2012-2013 school year ended in late July and during the long break between the 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 school years for MOP students. Vacation classes were held and led by Boa Woynko volunteers Florian Bernhart and Hannah Koeppl of Austria. Vacation classes are held to assist students in subjects and concepts they have learned but are still struggling with.

<u>August</u>

Enrollment reached an all time high as directors enrolled four new students for 2013-2014 school year. Deborah Kwasafo (5), Takifat Lawla (5), Etonum Atali (12) and Peace Atsu (9) were enrolled into KG1 at Mawuvio's Outreach. There are now 64 students attending school at MOP. All students come from families that are unable to afford public schooling costs.

<u>September</u>

The entire Mawuvio's Outreach community; students, teachers, board and community members mourned the sudden loss of Steven Farwell on September 27. Steve was father to MOP director Renee Farwell. Having visited MOP twice, he was highly respected by all MOP students, teachers and directors and referred to by all as "dad".
